## **1 About the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies (Master's Program)**

The Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies was established in April 2006. The purpose of the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies is to meet the needs for comprehensive research and education based on the knowledge of existing specialized fields (humanities and economics) and interdisciplinary fields (regional development studies and international studies) encompassed by the concept of "environment" in response to the rapid progress of globalization, information networking, and aging society with fewer children. The Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies also fosters professionals who understand and have the means to solve various problems facing contemporary society and people.

Through the education it provides, the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies has three goals. The first goal is to nurture advanced professionals who have acquired specialized knowledge, methods, and techniques, and who have the ability to formulate policies and solve problems, and to nurture human resources who can contribute to the development of their countries and international exchange. This corresponds to the diverse needs of society for graduate education. The second goal is the formation of an education and research center for human socio-environmental studies. This means establishing and developing interdisciplinary and comprehensive humanities and social sciences research as a pioneer not only in the Hokuriku region but also throughout Japan. And the third goal is to contribute to the regional and international community through education and research, and to return the results of education and research at the graduate level to society at home and abroad by actively promoting the acceptance of working students and international students.

The following shows the organization of divisions, courses, and programs, and the degrees to be conferred. Our goal is to create new knowledge that can accurately address contemporary issues, while continuing the existing fields of study.

## 2 Admission Policy

The Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies (Master' s Course) aims to nurture creative individuals who can play an active role in multidisciplinary fields involving the study of humans, human society, and the environment. Therefore, the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies seeks students who not only possess specialized academic skills in their respective fields of study but who are also willing to further advanced research from an interdisciplinary

and comprehensive perspective on the basis of these skills.

In order to accept students with a variety of backgrounds and orientations, we implement a variety of selection methods: General Selection, Special Selection for Working Adults, Special Selection for International Students, Special Selection by Recommendation for Applicants within the School, and Selection for the Short-term (1 Year) Enrollment-type System. In addition, in order to increase the number of opportunities to take the entrance examination, the entrance examination will be held twice a year, once in each of the first and second terms, depending on the selection method.

In General Selection, students who have graduated from universities and wish to enroll are mainly selected to determine whether they have sufficient specialized academic ability and qualifications to become researchers in the future, acquire a wide range of specialized knowledge, or become professionals.

In Special Selection for working adults, applicants who have accumulated various experiences and knowledge as a member of society after graduating from a university for a certain number of years will be screened to determine whether or not they have a certain level of specialized academic ability and a clear awareness of issues.

In the Special Selection for International Students, applicants who wish to study abroad from various countries are selected based on their specialized academic ability.

The Special Selection by Recommendation for Applicants within the School is conducted by the Division of Economics, and is open to students from related divisions of Kanazawa University who are closely related to the Division of Economics. Those with excellent grades are exempted from the written examination.

In addition to the standard program requiring at least two years of study, the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies (Master's Course) has established a Short-term (1 Year) Enrollment-type System for each major in economics and regional development studies, which enables students to obtain Master's degree in a short period while continuing working.

Selection for the Short-term (1 Year) Enrollment-type System is designed for those who have experience as working adults in local governments, corporations, schools, non-profit organizations, or the like, to compile theses (research papers) by conducting certain theoretical arrangements based on the issues, interests, and accumulated materials that they have developed through their work. Admission to the doctoral program after completing the course is not anticipated. If the applicant wishes to go on to the doctoral program, please apply for the ordinary Special Selection for Working Adults.

The Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies (Master's Program) offers various programs and courses under the four majors of Humanities, Economics, Regional Development Studies, and International Studies, and entrance examinations are conducted for each major. The admission policies for each major are listed below to provide a better picture of the students the school accepts under what kinds of educational objectives and goals.

if the enrollment for April admission in each division reaches the total recruitment number, general selection and special selection for working adults for October admission will not be conducted. Special selection for international students for October admission will be conducted even in the above case.

2: For the Certified Psychologist Training Program, the 2nd intake will be conducted only if the number of applicants does not reach the capacity in the first intake (\*4). The 2nd intake will be announced on the Graduate School's website in mid-October 2024. For details on the announcement of successful applicants, please refer to 11. Announcement of Successful Applicants. Transfer from other programs or divisions is not allowed after admission.

### 4 Application Qualification

Those who fall under any of the following categories or are expected to fall under such categories by March 31, 2025 shall qualify.

In the following selection, in addition to the above, it is necessary to satisfy the following application qualifications. In addition, only Japanese nationals or foreign nationals living in Japan can apply for the 2nd intake (April admission only).

Special selection for working adults: A person who has three or more years of experience as a working adult by March 31, 2025.

Special selection for international students: Persons who do not have Japanese citizenship.

Selection for the Short-term (1-year) Enrollment-type System: A person who has three or more years of work experience at a company by March 31, 2025 and who has permission from his/her senior.

Please refer to the page 6 for application qualification for the Special Selection by Recommendation for Applicants within the School.

- (1) A person who has graduated from a university described in Article 83 of the School Education Act (No. 26 of 1947 Act)
- (2) A person who has been granted a bachelor's degree pursuant to the provisions of Article 104, Paragraph 7 of the School Education Act
- (3) A Person who has completed a 16-year course of school education with a regular curriculum in a foreign country
- (4) A person who has completed a course of an educational institution in Japan which is recognized by his or her country as having a curriculum of a university under the said country's education system and which is designated separately by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (5) A person who has, while living in Japan, completed a 16-year course under the said foreign country's education system by taking subject classes at a foreign school through a distance learning system
- (6) A person who has been granted an academic degree equal to a bachelor's degree at a foreign university or other institution (limited to those institutions that have been evaluated by the foreign government or by persons who have the approval of foreign government or relevant organizations or designated separately to be an equivalent by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology in terms of comprehensive status of the education and research activities, etc.) by completing a program with a duration of study of three years or more (including those who have completed subject classes under a distance learning system offered by a foreign school while living in Japan or have completed a program at an educational institution in Japan that is part of the school education system of the specific country and that is separately designated by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology)
- (7) A person designated by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (8) A person who has completed a higher course of a specialized training college (restricted to colleges with a duration of four years or longer of study and that satisfies the standards determined by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology) separately designated by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology after a day decided by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (9) A person who has enrolled in a graduate school of another university pursuant to the provisions of Article 102, Paragraph 2 of the School Education Act and then who is recognized to have appropriate abilities to receive graduate school education at a graduate school of Kanazawa University.
- (10) A person who has enrolled in a university described in Article 83 of the School Education Act for three years or more by March 31, 2025, a person who has completed 15 years of school curriculum in a foreign country, a person who has completed in Japan a program of an educational institution which is recognized to have 15 years of school curriculum of the country under the school education system of the foreign country and which is designated separately by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology, or a person who has completed a 15-year of program under the education system of a foreign country by taking subject classes through a correspondence education system provided by a school in the foreign country while living in Japan and who is recognized as having acquired the prescribed number of credits with superior grades in a graduate school of the University
- (11) A person who has reached 22 years of age by March 31, 2025 and who is recognized as having academic abilities equivalent to or greater than those of persons described in Application Qualification (1) as a result of individual screening by a graduate school of the University



## **Application qualification and requirements for special selection (Division of Economics) by recommendation for applicants within the school**

- (1) Application is qualified for either the 1<sup>st</sup> intake or 2<sup>nd</sup> intake.
- (2) A person who is a fourth-year student at the School of Economics, College of Human and Social Sciences at Kanazawa University and expected to graduate by March 31, 2025 and who has good academic performance and character, and has a recommendation from their academic advisor or prospective academic advisor in this division, and meet the application requirements in (3).
- (3) Application requirements

- (1) A person who has a 2.2 total GPA or higher for specialized subjects as of their second semester in their third year.
- (2) A person who does not require more than four years to graduate, excluding a year off period.
- (3) A person who can guarantee enrollment if they pass the exam.

## **5 Preliminary examination of qualification**

Those who would like to apply under (6), (9), (10), (11) of 4. Application Qualification above are asked to submit the following materials to the Admission Team of the Student Affairs Division, Human and Social Administration Department, Kanazawa University for preliminary examination of qualification.

1<sup>st</sup> intake: By May 8 (Wed), 2024

2<sup>nd</sup> intake: By October 31 (Thu), 2024

When submitting materials by mail, "Application for Preliminary Examination of Qualifications for ○ period, Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environment Studies (Master's Course)" should be written in red on the front of the envelope.

- A Application Form for Preliminary Examination of Qualifications (a form designated by the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies)
- B Graduation (completion) certificate or a certificate of prospective graduation (completion) issued by the applicant's most recent school
- C Transcript issued by the applicant's most recent school
- D Curricula and syllabi of the applicant's most recent school or copies of equivalent documents
- E Curriculum vitae (in any form, approx. 800 words)
- F Research plan document (a form designated by the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies)
- G A document that describes the business or activities (in any form (book, graduation thesis, recommendation letter, etc.))
- H Return envelope (235 mm × 120 mm, self-addressed and stamped with 344 yen for express mail)

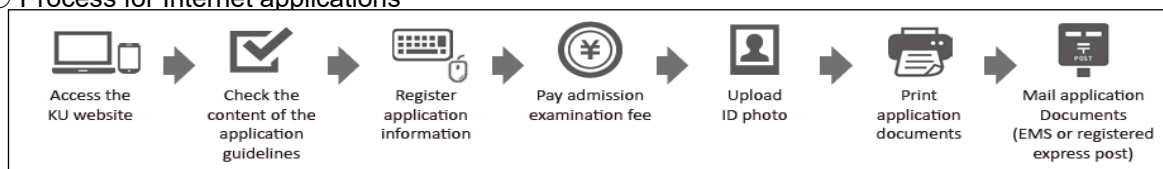

## 12 Admission Procedures

The period and method of admission procedures will be announced in the Graduate School Admission Procedure Guide in late February for successful applicants in the first intake, and after the announcement for successful applicants in the second intake.

International students residing abroad will be required to submit a bank account balance certificate (with a balance of 1,000,000 yen or more) after acceptance (in order to apply for the Certificate of Eligibility (COE)).

## 13 Tuition and Other Fees

(1) Entrance fee: 282,000 yen (tentative)

The following individuals do not need to pay the admission fee: the Japanese government scholarship international students.

(2) Tuition fee for the first semester: 267,900 yen (tentative) [annual tuition fee: 535,800 yen (tentative)]

(Notes)

① The above prices are tentative. If the amount of admission fee or tuition is changed before or after enrollment, the new price will be applied.

② Tuition is paid via direct debit. It will be automatically deducted from the bank account specified by the student on the specified date.

③ The Japanese government scholarship international students do not need to pay tuition.

## 14 Others

### (1) English Language Proficiency Tests

\*As part of our efforts to strengthen student English ability, in principle, one of the requirements for completion of the program is to obtain a score that meets a certain standard (equivalent to 600 points on the TOEIC (L&R)) after entering the program.

\*However, students who meet any of the following criteria are exempted from taking the English proficiency test. In order to be exempted, you must submit an Application for Exemption from the English Proficiency Test and undergo an examination.

[1] Those who have a TOEIC (L&R) score of 760, TOEFL-iBT score of 80, TOEFL-ITP score of 550, or IELTS score of 6.0 or higher.

[2] Those who have been admitted through the special selection for working adults or the short-term (1 year) enrollment-type system for students with disabilities.

[3] Native English speakers (those who were born and raised in a country where English is generally the official language and who have acquired English as their first language)

[4] Others who are approved by the Dean of the Graduate School.

\*The examination fee is to be paid by the student.

### (2) Standard term of study

The standard term of study for the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies (Master's Program) is two years (one year for the short-term (1-year) enrollment-type system). However, students with outstanding research achievements may be allowed to complete the program in one year.

### (3) Special exception for educational methods based on Article 14 of the Standards for the Establishment of Graduate Schools

The Graduate School offers a system of a Special Exception for Educational Methods Based on Article 14 of the Standards for the Establishment of Graduate Schools to facilitate graduate study for those who need it, such as those who are currently employed. By using this system, students can flexibly study under the permission and guidance of their academic advisor based on the curriculum stipulated in the regulations of the Graduate School of Human and Socio-Environmental Studies.

If you wish to apply for this system, please check  the Special Exception column of Article 14 on the application form. In addition, please submit a Letter of Consent for Examination (Form 2). Please note that Article 2-2 (Graduate courses offered exclusively in the evening) does not apply. The graduate school offers day/evening courses.

Reference: Standard for Establishment of Graduate School (Order of the Ministry of Education, Science and Culture No.28, 1974) (Extract)

Article 14: In the curriculum of the graduate school, if necessary from an educational standpoint, the education may be conducted by an appropriate method through classes or research guidance at night or other specific time or period.

### (4) Long-term enrollment system

Excluding Selection for the Short-term (1 Year) Enrollment-type System, the Graduate School offers a long-term enrollment system that allows an enrollment beyond the limit of standard course of study for

people with other responsibilities such as full-time work, housework, child-rearing, nursing for family members, and so on.

Through this system, the student's enrollment period can be extended within the limit set in the Graduate School Rules (generally four years at the master's course).

Total tuition amount is the same as that of standard course of study (master's course section: two years) and can be paid in parts while enrolled.

Eligible students must fall into one of the following categories and have difficulty completing their studies within the standard working years.

(a) Those who are gainfully employed (including temporary employment)

(b) Those who are engaged in housework, childcare, nursing care, etc.

(c) Those who have physical disabilities, intellectual disabilities, mental disabilities (including developmental disabilities), or other physical or mental functional disabilities.

If you wish to apply, please put a  in the "Long-term Enrollment System Preference" box on the application form.

Applications from students who wish to take long-term courses may not be approved in some cases.

#### **(5) Prior consultation for applicants with disabilities**

Applicants with mental or physical disabilities who require special consideration for the entrance examination and studies must submit the following documents to and consult with the Admission Team (Contact information listed in 16) by May 8, 2024 (Wednesday) for the first intake application and by October 31, 2024 (Thursday) for the second intake application.

i. Application form (including the following items and contact information, any format is acceptable)

- Name of the major and the course or program to which you are applying
- Type and degree of disability
- Special considerations desired for the examination and studies
- Special measures taken at the applicant's home institution
- Daily living conditions
- Other items of reference

ii. Medical certificate (a copy is acceptable)

iii. Other reference documents (a copy of a disability certificate, etc.)

#### **(6) Prior consultation for applicants who wish to take examinations and study in English**

If there is no special mention in the submission documents and selection method, the entrance examination will be conducted in Japanese.

Those who wish to take the examination and study in English should consult with their desired teacher in advance.

**15 Protection of Personal Information**

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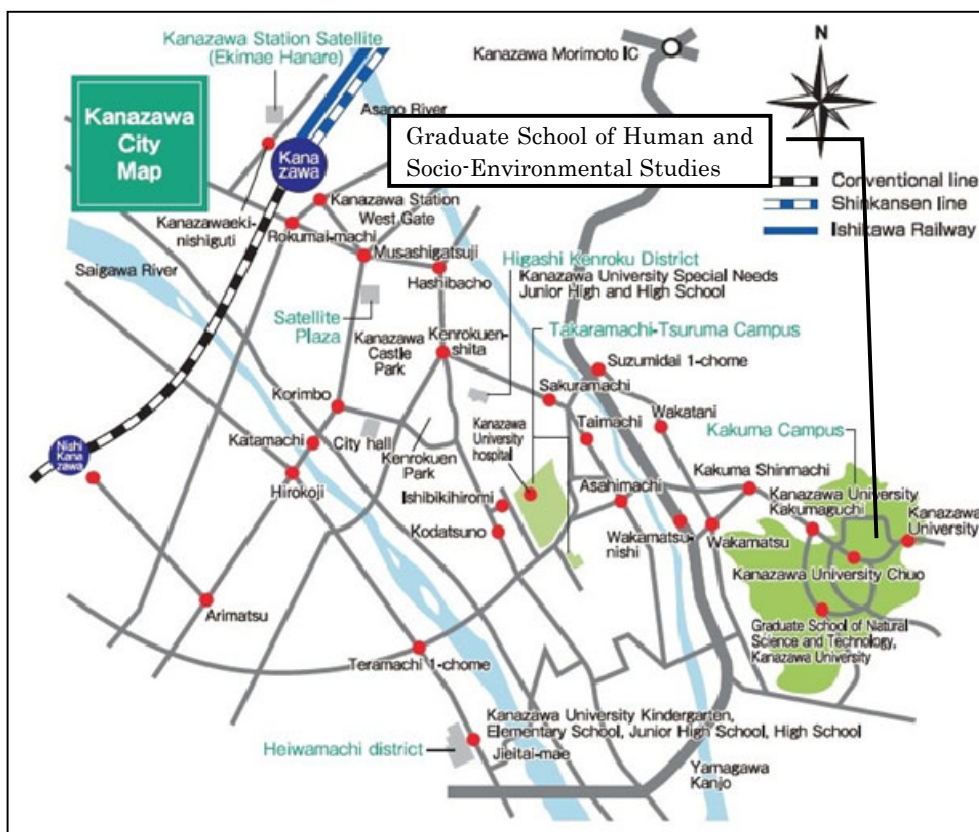
